## Women's Health Support

Desert Blue Connect is dedicated to enhancing the health and wellbeing of women in our community, with a particular focus on supporting vulnerable and at-risk women. We are committed to ensuring that every woman has access to comprehensive medical and mental health services.

This year, we marked a significant milestone by opening the new Women's Wellness Centre at 26 Durlacher Street, Geraldton. This achievement, years in the making, underscores our dedication to women's wellbeing and our commitment to accessible healthcare for women. The Women's Wellness Centre serves as a holistic hub for women's health, offering low-cost and bulk billing health services to prevent, treat, and manage women's health-related issues. Our team at the Women's Wellness Centre includes women's health doctors, nurses and counsellors.

### **Highlights & Achievements**

#### **Women's Wellness Centre Opening**

We successfully launched the Women's Wellness Centre on International Women's Day, the 8th of March 2023, with a well-attended opening night.

#### **Bulk Billing Doctor Service**

This year, we introduced a new bulk billing doctor and GP service for women, focusing on women's health-related concerns. This has significantly enhanced healthcare accessibility for women in our local community and is now one of the key offerings at the Women's Wellness Centre.

#### **Sexual Health Nurse and Sexologist**

We introduced a new sexual health nurse and sexologist service at our Women's Wellness Centre who provides STI screenings, cervical screenings, women's health advice, and counselling for women around intimacy and sex issues.

#### **Looking After Mums Program**

We have seen a continued increase in demand for our support services for new and expectant mothers in Geraldton, especially those diagnosed with or at risk of encountering mental health challenges during pregnancy and the early postpartum period.

### **Unplanned Pregnancy Counselling**

We continue to provide free, non-directive counselling, and evidence-based information regarding all unplanned pregnancy choices, including abortion, adoption, and parenting. Our approach is pro-choice and womancentred, empowering women with the tools and support to make the best decision for themselves. **1,244** clinical appointments booked with a women's health doctor or nurse.

## **Community Initiatives**

Desert Blue Connect is dedicated to fostering a healthier and safer community through impactful community initiatives focused on promoting women's health, preventing family violence, and empowering women. Our team's collective efforts this year, along with strong collaborations with stakeholders, have resulted in significant milestones driving positive community change.

### Highlights and Achievements Family Violence Prevention

### **Respectful Relationships Education**

We provided educational sessions on respectful relationships, and the prevention of sexual and family violence for local school-age children, equipping them with essential tools for building healthy relationships and preventing abuse.

### Walk Against Violence (WAVe) Event

Our annual WAVe event commemorated lives lost to family violence in WA, uniting our community to stand together and take action against violence.

### **Protective Behaviours**

Collaborating with Ngala, we facilitated sessions for parents and services providers, providing protective behaviours education and guidance for supporting children.

#### **Variety Midwest Ladies Luncheon**

We were chosen as the beneficiary of the Variety Midwest Ladies Luncheon, where their generous donations provided essential support for our primary prevention and therapeutic programs focused on children.

### **First Nations Women**

### Desert Rose First Nations Women's Resilience Program

Our Desert Rose program continued to empower First Nations women to reconnect to their culture, embrace their cultural identity, and find strength in healing. This year, we expanded its reach by introducing the program to women at Greenough Regional Prison and created a schoolbased version of the program, named Everlastings.

### **Desert Rose Support Group**

We established a support group exclusively for graduates of our Desert Rose program, ensuring ongoing support after completion of the program.

### **Community NAIDOC Event**

As part of the Justice and Community Network Committee, we helped facilitate a community NAIDOC event, celebrating the vibrant history, culture, and accomplishments of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples within our community.

#### Women's Health

#### **Mum's Wellbeing Expo**

In partnership with PANDA – Perinatal Anxiety & Depression Australia – we hosted the Mum's Wellbeing Expo, connecting new and expectant mothers with local services and businesses supporting perinatal mental health and overall well-being.

#### **Women's Health Week Events**

Partnering with Jean Hailes for Women's Health, we presented impactful events, including a menopause and pelvic health session in Geraldton and a mind and physical health morning tea in Coorow. These events provided vital information and support for women to make informed choices about their health and wellbeing.

#### Women's Health Morning Tea

A dedicated event for women living with disabilities, caregivers, and service providers, fostering a supportive space to acquire women's health knowledge about important health checks.

#### **Cervical Cancer Prevention**

We actively promoted cervical cancer prevention and developed informative messages about the newly available self-collection cervical screening tests. These messages were carefully tailored across various platforms to resonate with a range of diverse minority groups of women. 1,459

women have increased knowledge and skills to address health challenges from our support groups and education sessions.

## **Community, Respect & Equality**

Desert Blue Connect plays a crucial role in coordinating the Community, Respect & Equality (CRE) Initiative, a project aimed at fostering a community-wide commitment to preventing violence against women. In this capacity, we provided participants in the CRE Initiative with the essential tools and guidance to implement primary prevention strategies within their workplaces, organisations, and businesses. A significant expansion of the project this year was the launch of the Mid-West Early Years Gender Equality Project (MEYGE). MEYGE focuses on shaping equal gender roles and dismantling harmful stereotypes that contribute to family violence, especially during the critical early years when these values take shape.

### **Highlights & Achievements**

### **Strategic Development**

Initiated the development of a new CRE strategic direction and implementation plans in partnership with Health Communication Resources Inc (HCR), informed by national and international evidence to ensure future alignment and effectiveness.

### **Respectful Relationships Teaching Support Program**

Presented at the Starick Services Respectful Relationships Teaching Support Program Workshop for Mid-West schools, offering family and domestic violence prevention education and raising awareness of CRE and MEYGE.

### **Leading Lights Communication Group**

Our continued leadership in The Leading Lights Communication group played a pivotal role in crafting and distributing locally tailored primary prevention key messages. These messages were conveyed within the workplaces of CRE participants, reaching employees and extending through their individual communication networks to the wider community.

### **Radio MAMA Segment**

Introduced a monthly Radio MAMA segment into the overall CRE Communications Plan, further spreading awareness and fostering community discussions on family violence prevention and gender equality.

## Launch of the Mid-West Early Years Gender Equality Project

Initiated networking with early years' service providers to raise awareness about gender equality concepts for family violence prevention, emphasising the vital role of early years services in promoting gender equity.

### **Gender Equality Play Group Session**

Partnered with several local playgroups to deliver interactive and fun play sessions focusing on gender equality concepts, educating children during their early years.

### **Development of Gender Equality Resources**

Created local, culturally sensitive gender equality resources in consultation with community groups. These resources are now freely accessible for the local community and organisations to promote gender equality.

## **Family & Domestic Violence Support**

At Desert Blue Connect, we are dedicated to assisting individuals affected by family and domestic violence. Our goal is to provide support, advice, and advocacy to those who have experienced abuse from an intimate partner or family member. Ensuring the safety and well-being of each survivor is our utmost priority, empowering them to navigate their journey to recovery.

### **Highlights & Achievements**

#### **New Mobile Outreach Initiative**

Our new mobile outreach initiative provided ongoing support to women who have engaged with our crisis accommodation at Chrysalis House Women's Refuge. This ongoing assistance ensures that individuals continue to receive safety and support even after leaving the refuge.

### Barndimalgu Court Support

We supported women who experienced family violence from their partners or ex-partners and were referred to the Barndimalgu Court, the only Indigenous family violence court of its kind in Australia. Our support extended both within and outside the court, focusing on providing culturally appropriate and safe assistance to our clients.

### **Support for Animals**

Our team, in collaboration with the Animal Rescue Collective and The Pet Barn Foundation, has provided essential pet resources, including food, blankets, bowls, and treatments, to survivors of family or domestic violence. This support directly addresses the increased risk of animal cruelty faced by survivors who often worry about their pets' safety when leaving an abusive relationship.

### 16 Days in WA Morning Tea at Barndimalgu Court

During the '16 Days in WA' campaign, we organized a morning tea event at the Barndimalgu Court for key stakeholders. This event fostered essential conversations about unity and community safety.

### Women's Safety and Wellbeing Consultation Event

Desert Blue Connect hosted the Centre for Women's Wellbeing and Safety consultation in Geraldton, for the development of The Code of Practice. This event was open to all front-line staff, team leaders, and service managers of specialist family and domestic violence services, including counselling and legal services.

### **Strategic Advocacy**

We participated in national and state-level consultations on coercive control, aiming to establish a shared understanding of this issue and how to respond effectively. Furthermore, at the No to Violence Conference 2022, we delivered a presentation on the topic 'Victim Advocacy in the Barndimalgu Court: Challenging Victim Blaming and Misidentification'. Additionally, at the 6th Asia Pacific Safe & Together<sup>™</sup> Model Conference, we presented on the topic 'Post-Separation Coercion, Testimonial Injustice, and the Weaponization of Victim Survivors' Traumatic Experiences'.

## **Chrysalis House Women's Refuge**

Chrysalis House, Desert Blue Connect's women's refuge, provides secure temporary shelter for women and children who are fleeing family violence or facing homelessness due to crises. Our top priority is to empower survivors by offering them a secure place to stay, along with access to professional services to break free from the cycle of violence. Our dedicated team works passionately to create a safe and homelike environment, ensuring the safety and holistic wellbeing of those facing these challenging circumstances.

### **Highlights & Achievements**

#### **Refuge Improvements**

Over the past year we've implemented substantial security upgrades at our refuge, including the installation of additional security cameras and heavy-duty security screening for our doors. We've also prioritised client comfort by introducing new mattresses and hospital-grade protectors for improved hygiene and easier maintenance.

### **Dignity & Care**

We now provide our clients with Sunshine Bags from the Variety Club, containing new pyjamas, clothing, underwear, toiletries, and activities. Additionally, we've introduced Buddy Bags from the Allanah and Madeline Foundation and Betty Cares packs from the Betty Cares Foundation. These initiatives have replaced our reliance on second-hand donations and have significantly enhanced our clients' sense of dignity, especially during times of emotional distress.

#### **Donations**

## **Sexual Assault Support**

At Desert Blue Connect, we provide support and counselling to survivors of sexual assault or abuse. We recognise the profound impact that these experiences can have on individuals, and our approach is rooted in trauma-informed care. This service serves to support both adults and children over the age of three.

### **Highlights & Achievements**

#### **Counselling for Survivors**

We continued to provide counselling services for survivors of sexual assault, creating a safe and supportive environment for individuals on their healing journey. Our approach acknowledges the uniqueness of each survivor's path to recovery, providing tailored support and resources.

### **Child-Centred Play Therapy**

For our younger clients, we provided specialised support through child-centred play therapy, a therapeutic approach that engages children in play sessions to facilitate positive changes in behaviour, foster healing, stimulate growth, and promote overall development.

### **Midwest Sexual Assault Crisis Line**

We continued to offer the Midwest Sexual Assault Crisis Line, a 24/7 toll-free support service. This vital resource ensures that survivors of recent or historic sexual assaults have immediate access to assistance and counselling during times of crisis.

### **Health & Wellbeing Tips**

We initiated a new program delivering regular 'Health and Wellbeing Tips' to our clients of this service. These regular messages aim to inspire simple, healthy lifestyle habits, empowering survivors to take control of their health through manageable changes.

### **Aboriginal Services Listings Resource**

We developed a new comprehensive Aboriginal Services Listings resource for the Geraldton area. This resource has been shared with our clients and local organisations, to better support our local Aboriginal community.

## **Men's Support**

Desert Blue Connect is dedicated to fostering transformative change in men who have perpetrated violence against women and children. Our Men's Community Intervention Service (MCIS) is a specialised early engagement program for family violence intervention, incorporating strong accountability measures. We offer long-term counselling and trauma therapy for individuals genuinely committed to transformation. The impact of this service extends beyond the individual, delivering significant benefits to women, children, and the wider community.

### **Highlights & Achievements**

#### **Counselling for Transformation**

We continued to provide counselling, creating a safe and supportive environment for men to explore and modify their behaviour, fostering lasting change. Through regular counselling, we focused on examining and addressing deeply ingrained beliefs about violence, masculinity, control, and personal responsibility.

### **Reduction in Violence**

Numerous clients self-reported a substantial reduction in their use of violence, transitioning from physical to verbal aggression, or even eliminating their violent behaviour entirely following engagement with our service. Additionally, feedback from the partners of our clients highlights positive changes in the way they are spoken to – they experience more respect and feel genuinely heard.

### **Caring Dads Program**

We delivered the Caring Dads Program, a 17-week commitment that equips fathers with essential skills to strengthen their relationships with their children and partners. Participants have reported the program's effectiveness in promoting healthier fatherhood and fostering improved family dynamics.

### **Behaviour Change Group**

We facilitated a Behaviour Change Group that delved into crucial topics such as drug and alcohol abuse, exploring the impact of relationships with fathers and mother figures on participants' lives and their current partnerships.

### **Midwest Young Men's Service**

We introduced a specialised youth service tailored for young men and boys aged 25 and under. This programs funding finished in June 2023. This initiative provided a safe space for young perpetrators of family and domestic violence to receive counselling and education on healthy relationships.

"It is noted that several of the prisoners who are engaged with MCIS have shown behavioural changes. This is something I have noticed as I engage with them regularly. The Senior Prison Management staff and our Prison Counsellor (who also refers prisoners) consider MCIS a very valuable service which helps and supports prisoners struggling with working through change regarding being a domestic violence perpetrator."

## **Rural Support**

At Desert Blue Connect, we understand the unique challenges faced by individuals living in rural communities, which is why our rural support team remains committed to providing essential services to those residing across the North Midlands shires. Our Morawa office serves as the central hub for our team, who travel across the region to offer counselling and advocacy as well as health, wellbeing, prevention initiatives tailored to meet the specific needs of our rural community members.

### **Highlights & Achievements**

### **Rural Counselling Services**

We have maintained our commitment to providing free counselling services for both men and women in the North Midlands region. This service is comprehensive and not limited in scope – providing support for a wide array of issues, including but not limited to mental health, trauma, parenting, domestic violence and substance abuse.

### New Rural Children's Counselling Service

This year, we proudly introduced a new youth counselling service specifically designed for children aged 6 and above in the North Midlands region. This service offers crucial personalised support to young individuals, with a focus on promoting their safety, emotional wellbeing, and providing education on abuse prevention. It incorporates various therapeutic approaches, including play therapy and art therapy, to facilitate healing and recovery.

### Women's Health Week Event

As part of Jean Hailes Women's Health Week, we organised a Mind and Body Wellness event in Coorow. This event featured a mental wellbeing presentation and a talk about ways to stay physically active, promoting holistic wellbeing among women.

### **Community Connections Expo & Colour Run**

In partnership with the Shire of Morawa, we held a Community Connections Expo and Colour Run event in Morawa. This event helped connect the community in with essential community services such as Desert Blue Connect, Red Cross, St John's Ambulance, the Fire Department, and other local volunteer services.

### **Rural Women's Social Groups**

We started facilitating Women's Social Groups across the North Midlands region. These new social groups help support connection, emotional health, and holistic wellness, providing a vital support network for rural women.

### **Paint & Sip Sessions**

Our series of Paint and Sip sessions delivered in partnership with the Shire of Morawa offered an opportunity for social connection while engaging in creative expression.

### **Tandem Diversity & Inclusion Group**

Desert Blue Connect actively contributed to the Tandem Diversity and Inclusion Group, working to attract and support migrants who have chosen to live and work in Morawa. Our commitment to inclusivity ensures that newcomers to our region are welcomed and supported. **143** people supported by a rural based counsellor.






